

Fluency

Fluency is the ability to read with speed, accuracy and proper expression.

In order to understand what they read, students need to be able to read fluently whether that be silently or out loud.


Fluent readers when they read aloud:

- Read in phrases
- Add intonation at appropriate points
- And read smoothly and with expression




What not having fluency feels like to students:

- I seem to get stuck when I read a lot of words
- It takes me so long to read something
- Reading takes so much energy; I can't even think about what it means.



How to help develop fluency:

- Repeated Readings
- Audio Assisted Readings
- Shared Reading
- Paired (or partner) Reading
- Choral Reading
- Poetry Theater



Poetry is a wonderful tool to explore each of these!

Poetry is an irresistible way for students to learn to love reading, especially out loud! Who can resist humourous poetry by authors like Shel Silverstein and Jack Prelutsky


- Read/listen/record/share poetry read aloud

Recording Students

Students can practice reading poetry


- They can re-read while listening to their own another reader's voice
- Provides outstanding documentation of fluency development
- Students can illustrate their own poetry and record an audio rendition of the poetry
- Poems can be collected as a class journal around a theme, season or project

Tools to help create poetry

- iPads are my favorite content creation tool; most of these resources have online companions
- All of the 'experiences' with poetry build upon student's love of being read to, hearing poetry read aloud and experimenting with language
- The technology element of the tools can often bridge the 'gap' for nonfluent readers




Tools to help create poetry


- Begin with tools that allow students to simply 'move' words around to create their own poem
- Next use tools that allow structured poems around themes or poetic structures: acrostic, shape, diamante, haiku.






Poetry Creation Apps and Tools











Use a combination of tools to help develop fluency

- Record students reading their poetic creations
- Have them animate or illustrate their poetry and then use those animations in a slideshow or movie
- Have students perform their poems for one another; record and shared
