The Need for Help with Health

- 59% of U.S. adults searched online for health information last year
- > 1/3 have used the internet in an attempt to diagnose a medical condition
- > ¼ of Internet users who looked for health information online hit a paywall




Low Health Literacy

90+ million US adults have Low Health Literacy

- Adults 65+ years of age
- Racial and ethnic groups other than White
- Recent refugees and immigrants
- People with less than a high school degree or GED
- People with incomes at or below the poverty level
- Non-native speakers of English





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What can my library do?

- Conduct a Community Health Assessment
- Develop strategies to address health needs
- Promote health through collections, services, programming and promotion
- Evaluate your efforts with Project Outcome


